Cabot Cliffs named best new golf course

INVERNESS- One of the most prestigious sources for information on the sport of golf has the highest possible praise for a local course.

Cabot Cliffs was recently named the "Best New Course for 2015" by Golf Digest.

The Inverness golf course, designed by Bill Coore and golf great Ben Crenshaw, earns the accolade by beating out a range of other high profile courses, including Trump Golf Links in New York, which took second place; The Links at Brunello in Timberlea, Nova Scotia, which took third; and Adena Golf and Country Club of Ocala, Florida, which finished fourth.

Cabot Cliffs earned the top spot decisively, getting the edge on Donald Trump's Bronx course by a margin of five points. The scoring system used by Golf Digest usually sees the top spot won or lost by a far closer margin.

In the digest's most recent 100 greatest rankings, less than two-tenths of a point decided Augusta National ought to earn the top spot over Pine Valley.

Ron Whitten, one of the scribes for Golf Digest, wrote in his review of the course that his visit to Cabot Cliffs left him feel-

ing "giddy" due to the quality of the experience. "This is the second coming of Cypress Point, which in my mind was previously unmatched in its beauty, variety and thrills," Whitten said as part of his review.

Cypress Point is a Californian course that's a regular fixture in Golf Digest's list of America's 100 Greatest.

Whitten said a big reason for the success of Cabot Cliffs is the ample exposure to the shoreline, which isn't just visible at the end of the round. Players are able to see the shoreline "early and often" when playing at the local course.

Cabot Cliffs is the second course to open in recent years in Inverness, as Cabot Links currently sits at 42nd among Golf Digest's ranking of the World's 100 Greatest.

Whitten said that he feels Cabot Cliffs, in some ways, might be superior to its predecessor.

'As great as Cabot Links is, it cannot match Cabot Cliffs' closing stretch," he stated.

Also breaking the top three in *Golf Digest's* list is The Links at Brunello, located not far from Halifax. The course was designed by Tom McBroom, and it cuts a path through forest and eye-catching boulders.

"In any other year, Brunello would be the talk of Nova Scotia, if not Canada," stated Whitten.
